What is Major Dailies Historical?

ProQuest's Major Dailies Historical is an archive of five U.S. newspapers: Chicago Tribune, Los Angeles Times, New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, and The Washington Post. These five are some of the most respected regional and national papers of record. It includes content from 1849-2018 in the various papers. Articles and content can be viewed individually or as parts of the original pages they were printed on.

How to Access Major Dailies Historical?

- 1. Go to the library's website, www.lincolnwoodlibrary.org
- 2. Hover over Resources. Select Quick Links.
- 3. Select the **Major Dailies Historical** resource for the paper you want to read (see list above).
- If you're outside of the library building, you may have to enter your full library card number 21242000XXXXXX (without any spaces) to log in.

What you can access with Major Dailies Historical

Major Dailies Historical provides access to sections or whole pages of its covered newspapers. Whole page views show advertisements, pictures and illustrations, and logos/mastheads. Content includes articles, events, obituaries, sports, and more.

Browsing newspapers by day

From the homepage, select a paper name or the \equiv button. If you selected the \equiv button:

- Select Change Databases. Select + by Historical Newspapers.
- · Select the paper you're interested in from the list.
- Then select **Publications** and select the one that includes the year you're looking for.

If you selected a paper name from the homepage:

• Select Publications. Select the proper issue for a certain year.



Selecting these options takes you directly to the first day of that section of the publication. Use the three **Choose an issue to view** dropdowns to select a different day and then select **View issue**.

Links to editions of each paper

Over the years the names of these papers sometimes changed, and they are split up into multiple subsets covering certain years.

Within each paper, you can pick an edition that includes the year you're looking for, and either generally search or browse to a specific day.

Searching and results pages

You can search within issues if you know what day you need. But if you're not sure what day you're looking for, you can do general searches of everything in Major Dailies Historical or of specific papers. There are search boxes on many pages. Type keywords and then select **Search** or **Q** buttons to see results.

Search within this publication...

Select the headline of a result to see its full display. Select Abstract/Details to see more data about an item. Select Full text to see transcribed plaintext of the item. Select Full text – PDF to see the article scan. Select Page view – PDF to see everything on the same page.

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- You can use **Sorted by** and choose from **Relevance**, **Oldest first**, or **Most recent first**.
- You can remove abstracts with Limit to D Full text.
- Select ranges of **Publication dates** by dragging the left and right sliders and then select **Update**.
- Select ∨ arrows to show even more filtering options, or hide them by selecting ∧.

Results show headline, author, publication date, and paper section. Select any headline to see the full display of that article.

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You may want to take time to read longer articles and avoid the 30 minute inactivity logout. You can download articles for permanent use by viewing the **Full text** – **PDF** or **Page view** – **PDF** options.

Then either select the **Download PDF** button or use the standard save options in the PDF viewer that appears. (Save options are usually \downarrow arrows.) The PDF may open automatically in an offline viewer, or it may download using your normal system settings and go to your Downloads, Documents, or Desktop, depending on your settings.

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Near the option to download an article is a " button to cite the article if you are using it in a research paper.

- Select the Cite option.
- Select an option in the drop down menu beneath **Copy citations directly into your paper**. Highlight the provided citation text and copy/paste into your paper.

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


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Select the X to exit out of the Cite menu to return to the article.

Emailing articles

Select the **Email** option near the headline to start emailing the article you're viewing.



- Type your <u>email@address.com</u> in the Email addresses text box and/or the email address of anyone else you want to send the article to. Separate each email address with a, character.
- Type your name in the required **Your name** text box field.
- You can also change the Subject and type a Message about the article to send in the email.
- Select Cancel if you've changed your mind to return to the article, or select Continue to have U.S. Major Dailies email the article.

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Select the **Print** option near the headline to start printing Print an article you're viewing. It will pull up the same PDF that displays in the Full text - PDF mode. It may automatically open your standard print settings. If it does not, use your standard PDF viewer controls to start printing.

More options

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See even more options for working with article content in the ... All options menu. This includes saving to cloud Options services like Google Drive or Microsoft OneDrive, exporting citations to managers like RefWorks, and downloading in formats other than PDF. Select the X or Close buttons to exit out of this menu.

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Searching more

From an article you're viewing, select the \mathbf{Q} button near the name of the newspaper the article was published by to search

that paper for more.



Or select the \equiv button and then select **Change databases**.

Exiting an article

From an article you're viewing, select < **Back to results** to go back to your search. Select **More like this** > to see similar articles.

Browse page views

From an article you're viewing, select **Browse this issue** to see page-by-page views. Use the text box to manually type in a page number and select **Go**. Or use the $\blacktriangleleft \triangleright$ arrow buttons to switch between pages. $|\blacktriangleleft$ goes to the first and $\triangleright|$ goes to the last page.



In this view, you can hover over page images and articles will be highlighted in boxes. Select any part of the boxed in areas of articles to be taken to their full views.

Major Dailies Historical doesn't have an app. It is best viewed on desktop/laptop computers, but works on mobile devices.

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
